Social behaviour is an important aspect of dealing with people face-to-face. Though there are certain standards for appropriate behaviour, some general rules are universally followed. 5

It is important to be able to talk about things that are not connected with business with colleagues. They help build up a warm, friendly relationship and you get to know each other better. Generally, people engage in small talk just after having exchanged greetings and asking after. One usually talks about journey, weather, family, common friends, etc. Similarly, before ending the conversation and bidding goodbye, small talk about coffee/lunch/snacks, travel, etc., often occur. At a party or lunch, the range of topics is wider.

The issue of what topics are suitable when talking to strangers, especially foreigners, is rather complex personal. It is best to avoid politics, religion and family as they are too personal. It is safe to talk about holidays, travel, traffic, public transport, tourist interests, etc. Indeed the purpose of a social conversation with a new person is to discover what you have in common, so that you can exchange experience. If the other person is older and senior to you, you might be more respectful and ask him or her questions that explore more information so you can learn from them.
